Wasatch County property taxes have increased significantly since 2000, with some years seeing double-digit growth. This is primarily due to rising property values, driven by strong economic growth and increased demand for housing in the area.

- 3/4" residential user with no overage pays \$336 per year
- 1" residential user with no overage pays \$672 per year

- Limit program to 65 or older?
 - Opt In participation
- Only allow for customers within Midway City limits
- Additional reduced rate for <10,000
 Gallons per month?
- Still charge for overage usage >10,000
 Gallons
- Assuming 10% reduction in billing revenue, could be more or less.
- Currently \$13.8 M in Water Fund reserves, with \$8.9 M in excess of policy controlled balance
